Our Mission Viewed Through the Lens Of the Westminster Confession

God's Purpose for Man

"Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy him forever."

(Question # 1, The Westminster Shorter Catechism.) Jesus was very clear in teaching HOW we can best glorify God. "By this is My Father glorified, that you bear much fruit and so prove to be my disciples." (John 15:8.) Biblically, there are 2 categories of spiritual fruit, our inward attitudes and our outward actions. Galatians 5:22-23 makes clear that spiritual fruit is Christ-like character: "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." Colossians 1:10 makes clear that spiritual fruit also includes our actions: "So that you may live a life worthy of the Lord, and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work..." Therefore, we have 3 parts to our mission.

God's Purpose for Man

Our Mission Viewed Through Christ's Ministry to us as the Anointed One

Through the three offices to which our Lord was anointed, prophet, priest, and king, he demonstrates not only his intercessory ministry to us, but what redeemed humanity is to look like. In Christ, we are:

Priest: The priests were those who ministered in the presence of God himself, and their ministry was to restore God's people to an intimate, personal relationship with him.

"To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood, and has made us to be a kingdom and priests..." Rev. 1:5-6

Prophet: The prophet's role was to reveal God's law and to call his covenant people to holiness of character. Jesus is the final revelation of that Word, the perfect embodiment of holiness in his attitudes. "But just as he who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do." I Peter 1:15

King: Adam and Eve were created to be king and queen of creation—to exercise dominion over the earth. When they rebelled, their kingdom was taken from them and made subject to Satan, sin, and death. Jesus Christ, the second Adam defeated this evil triumvirate at the cross, and restores us to our role as kings and queens who are called to exercise dominion over every sphere of our lives for our king.

"But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness." Matt. 6:33 "Pray then like this...may your kingdom come..." Matt. 6:10

Our Mission Viewed Through Christ's Ministry to us as the Anointed One

Through the three offices to which our Lord was anointed, prophet, priest, and king, he demonstrates not only his intercessory ministry to us, but what redeemed humanity is to look like. In Christ, we are:

Priest: The priests were those who ministered in the presence of God himself, and their ministry was to restore God's people to an intimate, personal relationship with him.

"To him who loves us and has freed us from our sins by his blood, and has made us to be a kingdom and priests..." Rev. 1:5-6

Prophet: The prophet's role was to reveal God's law and to call his covenant people to holiness of character. Jesus is the final revelation of that Word, the perfect embodiment of holiness in his attitudes. "But just as he who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do." I Peter 1:15

- 5. Offering Ourselves to God: "Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to Godwhich is your spiritual worship." (Rom. 12:1)
- 6. Abiding in God's love: "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you. Now abide in my love." (John 15:9) "As a bridegroom rejoices over his bride, so will your God rejoice over you." (Is. 62:5)

D. <u>This relationship, like all relationships, can only grow through regular time spent together.</u>

- 1. This regular, daily time with God has often been called a "Quiet Time" (QT.)
- 2. Insights for establishing a regular QT with God:
 - Remember you are meeting a person, not completing a task. The goal is to connect with the Lord, not get a certain number of verses read.
 - The key to having a morning quiet time is <u>getting to</u> <u>bed early</u>. The key to having an evening quiet time is heading to bed early.
 - Don't be discouraged when your schedule is thrown off track. That's the way life is. The key to selfdiscipline is NOT avoiding interruptions in the routine. It is getting back to the routine quickly after the interruption.
 - Don't become legalistic, but recognize your need of spiritual nutrition. After missing 2 or 3 physical meals we experience a certain "urgency" to get the nutrition we need. It should be the same if we miss 2 or 3 spiritual meals.
 - A prayer journal, which enables consistent prayer and increases awareness of answers is a vital tool.

E. Quiet Time Plan

- When and where will I have my quiet time?
- What help will I use or passage will I study?
- Whom will I ask to hold me accountable?

How to Fight: Forming Your Strategy for Prevailing Prayer

So I ask that you help me honor you with my body by helping me be disciplined enough to _____ (work out, eat right, stay sexually pure, etc.) I know this is your will for me and you have promised therefore to answer this prayer.

2. vs. 10 "May your kingdom come."

- Lord, help Jane on the job to live out your kingdom values
- Lord, use Jim in a powerful way for your kingdom in his neighborhood.
- Lord lead me to those in my neighborhood in whose heart you are working to draw them into your kingdom.
- Lord, help my son be bold in standing up for your kingdom values in his classes today

How to Fight: Forming Your Strategy for Prevailing Prayer

Jesus answered this question. When in Luke 11 Jesus was asked by his disciples to teach them to pray, Jesus gave 5 petitions (that are expanded to 6 in Matt 6:9-13.) These petitions represent 6 categories for prayer requests.

- Lord, use Jim in a powerful way for your kingdom in his neighborhood.
- Lord lead me to those in my neighborhood in whose heart you are working to draw them into your kingdom.
- Lord, help my son be bold in standing up for your kingdom values in his classes today

3. vs. 10b "May your will be done on earth as it is in heaven."

a. God promises to grant our request when we pray according to his will.

 - Keep your prayer journal where you can use it when you pray, and USE IT.
 - This enables you to be persistent in asking, which is one of the requirements for answered prayer.
- "... yet because of the man's persistence he will give him as much as he needs. So I say to you: Keep asking and it will be given to you; keep seeking and you will find; keep knocking and the door will be opened to you." Luke 11:9.
 - Most importantly, writing down specific requests enables you to see the answers to your prayers much more clearly—and it is seeing answers that is the greatest motivation to keep praying.
 - 4. Review God's prayer promises often.

Staying Focused On Our Mission

Establish a weekly "briefing with the King."

- 2. A great way to be sure you get this time is to steal some time for a weekly briefing with the King Sunday afternoon or evening

"If you call the Sabbath a delight and the Lord's holy day honorable, and if you honor it by not going your own way and not doing as you please or speaking idle words, then you will find your joy in the Lord." (Is. 58:13-14)

- The FOCUS notebook is designed so that you can personalize it into your mission statement, plan your strategy for accomplishing your mission, and review that plan with the Lord each week during.
- 4. Unless you clearly define your mission, take time to plan the strategy to accomplish your mission, and regularly review your mission plan, it is unlikely that you will be able to stay focused on your mission. This weekly time is critical for realigning and refocusing your life around Christ's mission for you.

Desires

- 1. We must go on the offensive and delight ourselves in the Lord—i.e. be intentional about *enjoying God.*
- 2. We must understand the desires of the masculine heart and the idols we easily turn to in order to satisfy those desires.

Desires

Enjoying God

"Rejoice in the Lord always." (Phil. 4:4)

One reason lust reigns in so many is that Christ has so little appeal. You were created to treasure Christ with all your heart—more than you treasure sex or sugar. 4 Hindrances to Enjoying God

Enjoying God

C. Inability to grasp the truth of our adoption as sons

1. Explanation: Many men have grown up with fathers who have been absent or emotionally distant, leaving them with no pattern for relating emotionally to their heavenly father. Initially, they will have trouble building a personal relationship with God, but if they persevere, the doctrine of their adoption into God's family as sons will become very precious, as will the privilege of calling God, "Abba."

2. Scripture:

 "For you did not receive a spirit that makes you a slave again to fear, but you received the Spirit of sonship. And by him, we cry **Abba, Father.**" Rom. 8:15-16

- If we do not really understand grace, our shame will cause us to hesitate to come to God
- We will experience distance in our relationship with God if we are harboring pockets of sinful behavior patterns that we refuse to give up.

C. Inability to grasp the truth of our adoption as sons

1. Explanation: Many men have grown up with fathers who have been absent or emotionally distant, leaving them with no pattern for relating emotionally to their heavenly father. Initially, they will have trouble building a personal relationship with God, but if they persevere, the doctrine of their adoption into God's family as sons will become very precious, as will the privilege of calling God, "Abba."

A. Walk daily with God

- 2. This regular, daily time with God has often been called a "Quiet Time" (QT.)
- 3. Insights for establishing a regular QT with God:
 - Remember you are meeting a person, not completing a task. The goal is to connect with the Lord, not get a certain number of verses read.
 - The key to having a morning quiet time is <u>getting to</u> <u>bed early</u>. The key to having an evening quiet time is heading to bed early.
 - Don't be discouraged when your schedule is thrown off track. That's the way life is. The key to selfdiscipline is NOT avoiding interruptions in the routine. It is getting back to the routine quickly after the interruption.
 - Don't become legalistic, but recognize your need of spiritual nutrition. After missing 2 or 3 physical meals we experience a certain "urgency" to get the nutrition we need. It should be the same if we miss 2 or 3 spiritual meals.
 - A prayer journal, which enables consistent prayer and increases awareness of answers is a vital tool.

E. Give your treasure to God.

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasure I heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Matt. 6:21.

"Offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God— this is your spiritual act of worship. Rom 12:1

Whether it is **material treasure** or the more valuable **treasure of our time**, there is a critical principle that involves the heart. That is the principle of giving to God the first-fruits. Not only does God promise us rewards for doing so, but Jesus tells us that **our hearts will follow our investments.** Giving to God the first portion of our paycheck and the first day of the week will cause our hearts to deepen their delight in God. Specifically, giving God the first day of the week is associated in Isaiah 58 with joy.

Giving to God the first portion of our paycheck and the first day of the week will cause our hearts to deepen their delight in God. Specifically, giving God the first day of the week is associated in Isaiah 58 with joy.

Thirty years ago there were fewer than a thousand X rated movie theaters in America. Now they are a click away in nearly every home via the Internet. There used to be social barriers to hinder the pursuit of pornography—going to a sleazy part of town and asking the drug store clerk to give you Penthouse. Those barriers are gone.
- 3. God has designed us so we sexually glue to whatever we are looking at when we have a sexual release—a fabulous idea if we never have a sexual release except with our wife. That way we would never tire of sex with our wife nor lose interest when she loses her youthful beauty. But in a fallen world, we fantasize and look at porn for sexual release. This behavior addicts us slowly to porn, instead of addicting us sexually to our (future) wife. "When a man ejaculates, his brain receives its maximum chemical reward. Whatever he looks at while having an ejaculation is what he will sexually 'glue to. Whatever his eyes focus on when he sexually releases—a person, image or object—will become etched in his brain as a photographic attachment towards that person, image, or object. I call it 'sex glue." (Ibid) Repeated use of porn along with masturbation glues us (binds us) to desiring sexual release through porn and fantasy. This bondage explains why 99.9% of married men who had regularly used porn while single return to it after marriage.

As John Piper points out, "One reason lust reigns in so many is that Christ has so little appeal. You were created to treasure Christ with all your heart—more than you treasure sex or sugar. If you have little taste for Jesus, competing pleasures will triumph. Plead with God for the satisfaction you don't have. Quote Psalm 14, "Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love that we might rejoice and be glad all our days." Then, look, look, LOOK at the most magnificent person in the universe until you see him the way he is."

When the Apostle Paul is addressing the sexual sin of the Corinthians, his approach is not to simply say, "Stop it!" Rather, he tells them that the answer to their deepest longings is not the false intimacy of sexual sin but true intimacy with the Lord. "You were made for God and he is the answer to our deepest longings." 1 Cor. 6:13. In my life, I've learned that I have to keep drinking gulps of intimacy and love in my relationship with God or else the polluted water of sinful sexual gratification will appeal too much to my thirst.

3. Part three of a heart-transforming strategy for defeating lust is to guard and protect our hearts. Proverbs 4:23 urges us, "Above all else, guard your heart, for it is the wellspring of life." The motivation to watch over our heart comes from realizing how much sexual sin costs. Sin always costs—the wage is death. Something is lost or damaged when we surrender to sexual sin. It is only when we realize what sexual sin costs that we can hate it, as Paul commands us in Rom. 12:9, "Hate what is evil; cling to what is good." Here is just a cursory look at the cost of sexual sin:

If you have little taste for Jesus, competing pleasures will triumph. Plead with God for the satisfaction you don't have. Quote Psalm 14, "Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love that we might rejoice and be glad all our days." Then, look, look, LOOK at the most magnificent person in the universe until you see him the way he is."

When the Apostle Paul is addressing the sexual sin of the Corinthians, his approach is not to simply say, "Stop it!" Rather, he tells them that the answer to their deepest longings is not the false intimacy of sexual sin but true intimacy with the Lord. "You were made for God and he is the answer to our deepest longings." 1 Cor. 6:13. In my life, I've learned that I have to keep drinking gulps of intimacy and love in my relationship with God or else the polluted water of sinful sexual gratification will appeal too much to my thirst.

3. Part three of a heart-transforming strategy for defeating lust is to guard and protect our hearts. Proverbs 4:23 urges us, "Above all else, guard your heart, for it is the wellspring of life." The motivation to watch over our heart comes from realizing how much sexual sin costs. Sin always costs—the wage is death. Something is lost or damaged when we surrender to sexual sin. It is only when we realize what sexual sin costs that we can hate it, as Paul commands us in Rom. 12:9, "Hate what is evil; cling to what is good." Here is just a cursory look at the cost of sexual sin:

- Surrendering to lust inflames your sexual desires making it harder to resist temptation next time.
- Every surrender brings you closer to the destructive life style of sexual addiction.
- Surrendering to lust damages you spiritually. "I urge you to abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against your soul." 1 Pet. 2:11
- Training yourself in sexual indulgence may eventually cost you your wife and children as it has many including King David.
- Pornography inspired masturbation trains and locks a man into impersonal sex, an approach to sex that will eventually be completely unfulfilling to his future wife.

"Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows. The one who sows to please his sinful nature will reap destruction; the one who sows to please the Spirit, from the Spirit will reap life." Gal. 6:7-8.

When a Christian husband and wife are feasting their hearts on emotional and sexual intimacy with each other, they are far less vulnerable to temptation than when there is a loss of such intimacy. But often, there is a gradual loss of such intimacy in marriage. In fact, 83% of men say that their wives don't understand their need for **sexual intimacy**, and the same percentage (83%) of wives say that their husbands don't understand their need for **emotional intimacy**.

This intimacy misconnect can send a marriage into a downward spiral with each partner feeing unsatisfied and distance setting into the relationship. A wife needs emotional

Real Marriage in a Fallen World

- A. After the honeymoon, busy schedules and long to-do lists replace the delightful hours of sharing during courtship. Intimacy of heart and soul begins to fade.
 - It gets harder and harder to find time to talk.
 - Conversation begins to center around the decisions and needs of the family—not the deep feelings of the heart.
 - Disagreements on some subjects place them off limits for discussion, which further contributes to isolation.
 - Career responsibilities increase, demanding greater time and energy.
 - Couples drift more and more into their own worlds.
 - A large majority of female divorcees say that their married years were the loneliest years of their lives. (Steve Arterburn & Fred Stoeker, <u>Every Woman's Desire</u>)
- B. Most husbands don't commit themselves to meeting their wife's need for intimacy of heart and soul.
 - 84% of wives report that their husbands don't have a clue how to meet their need for emotional intimacy (oneness) in their marriages. (Ibid)

Real Marriage in a Fallen World

- A. After the honeymoon, busy schedules and long to-do lists replace the delightful hours of sharing during courtship. Intimacy of heart and soul begins to fade.
 - It gets harder and harder to find time to talk.
 - Conversation begins to center around the decisions and needs of the family—not the deep feelings of the heart.
 - Disagreements on some subjects place them off limits for discussion, which further contributes to isolation.
 - Career responsibilities increase, demanding greater time and energy.
 - Couples drift more and more into their own worlds.
 - A large majority of female divorcees say that their married years were the loneliest years of their lives. (Steve Arterburn & Fred Stoeker, Every Woman's Desire)
- B. Most husbands don't commit themselves to meeting their wife's need for intimacy of heart and soul.
 - 84% of wives report that their husbands don't have a clue how to meet their need for emotional intimacy (oneness) in their marriages. (Ibid)
 - Very few husbands understand their wife's need for emotional intimacy. Most men compartmentalize. They feel close to their wives when they are interested in making love. Otherwise, their wives are rarely in their thoughts.

- C. Be charitable. Don't assume a selfish motive. "Love always trusts." (I Cor. 13:7) Give your mate the benefit of the doubt.
- D. Avoid character attacks: "You always...You never...You're just like your mother..."
- E. Focus on expressing how you feel. "When you do that, it makes me feel like..."
- F. Recognize that because you are different, there are some things you may never agree upon. That's okay.
- G. If you can't agree on a decision to be made, pray about it, asking God to tell you what He is saying through your mate.
- H. If you can't reach agreement, put off the decision as long as is reasonable.
- I. If there is no agreement and the decision has to be made, the husband has the final responsibility to make the decision and accept the consequences.
- J. When disagreement provokes anger, follow these steps:
 - 1. When you feel anger rising inside, take a 30-minute time out to let the anger cool.
 - 2. Use that 30 minutes to trace your anger back to the source of pain that is causing it.

Character Development Training Plan

1. Teach *attentiveness*

- Pre-requisite to obedience.
- When speaking to your child, always require him to look you in the eyes.
- Teach attentiveness to you.
- Teach attentiveness to his conscience.
- Teach **obedience** by **setting limits**. Toddlers need to know that painful punishment will follow if they go beyond the limit.
 - Limits begin in infancy with learning not to touch.
 - "No" means **NO**. Disobedience is punished by a light slap on the hand
 - Limits begin to kick in formally during the toddler years, as children learn they are not the boss. Limits continue throughout childhood and even into the teen years (though the teen should need fewer limits because he is learning to regulate his own behavior.)
 - Limits teach children they are not entitled to whatever they want.
 - Limits give children the structure they need to feel secure.
 - Whatever level of obedience you demand, they will eventually live up to. If you say, "come" and they know that they will be punished if they don't instantly come, they will learn immediate obedience. If they know that your "come" does not mean that they must come immediately, they will dilly dally. Kids who don't come immediately don't come because they haven't been required to.

3. Teach contentment.

- Contentment is "realizing that God has already provide everything I need for my present happiness."
- Teach kids who are bored that they are responsible for their own happiness.

<u>Character Development Training Plan</u>

1. Teach attentiveness

- Pre-requisite to obedience.
- When speaking to your child, always require him to look you in the eyes.
- Teach attentiveness to you.
